

The Pastor's Corner

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Happy Epiphany: On this great Christmas feast of the Epiphany, we celebrate the Epiphany, or Manifestation, of the Lord! We celebrate that we have come to know the One who has been born for us a savior! The Catechism has a beautiful teaching on the Epiphany: "The Epiphany is the manifestation of Jesus as Messiah of Israel, Son of God and Savior of the world. The great feast of Epiphany celebrates the adoration of Jesus by the wise men (magi) from the East, together with his baptism in the Jordan and the wedding feast at Cana in Galilee. In the magi, representative of the neighboring pagan religions, the Gospel sees the first fruits of the nations, who welcome the good news of salvation through the Incarnation. The magi's coming to Jerusalem in order to pay homage to the king of the Jews shows that they seek in Israel, in the messianic light of the star of David, the one who will be king of the nations. Their coming means that pagans can discover Jesus and worship him as Son of God and Savior of the world only by turning towards the Jews and receiving from them the messianic promise as contained in the Old Testament. The Epiphany shows that "the full number of the nations" now takes its "place in the family of the patriarchs" and acquires Israeliticia dignitas (is made "worthy of the heritage of Israel"). " (CCC 528)





The Catechetical Corner



I DID NOT KNOW THAT

Throughout my years of working in the Church in one capacity or another, I have noticed that one topic causes great confusion to many people. One would think this topic would be the mystery of the Holy Trinity or the hypostatic union of Christ's natures, but no. One of the most confusing and misinformed topics is that of divorce in the Catholic Church. As we are in the midst of the time of year when many young men and women are getting engaged, I would like to take this opportunity to discuss the other reality. Sometimes, marriages do not work. Sometimes, it is not the fault of one party or the other, but a simple growing apart. Other times, there are traumatic events that lead to a divorce. No matter what the case may be, there is one certainty. Divorce is difficult. Even if you are delighted to get rid of your spouse and have one of those "divorce parties," deep down, a part of you is affected and diminished. Here, I would like to write about how the Catholic Church views divorce and how we are here to help you.

To understand the Church's view of divorce, one must understand our view of marriage. Marriage between a man and a woman is a sacrament in the Catholic Church. It's both a sign of the love between Christ and his Church and a participation in that love. St. Paul calls this a "great mystery" in Ephesians 5:32. Catholics believe that marriage is permanent "till death do us part." This teaching comes from Christ, as recorded in Scripture (Mt 5:31-32 and 19:3-9, Mk 10:2-12, Lk 16:18). Our marriage vows reflect this. We promise our spouse fidelity, indissolubility (permanence), and openness to children. This is not a list of rules cooked up by the Catholic Church. It describes what marriage is—natural marriage, as God intended, as we feel naturally drawn to. As Jesus said, "So

they are no longer two but one flesh. What therefore God has joined together, let not man put asunder." (Mt 19:6). That's why we say that the Sacrament of marriage is indissoluble. And even the Catholic Church can't dissolve a valid marriage. If that is the case, how do we become free to marry another person?

When you become divorced through the civil court system, the Church still views you as being in a valid marriage. You may have heard it said that once you get divorced, you can no longer partake of the Sacraments. This is entirely incorrect. I wish I could collect everyone who says this and slap them around a little. Divorce does not bar you from receiving Holy Communion or any other Sacrament. What does bar you from receiving the Sacraments is getting remarried before receiving an annulment from the Church. Since the Church still views your first marriage as valid, any attempt to remarry without the Church declaring your first marriage invalid results in an irregularity. First, the Church will view you as being married to two people. Second, as you will have been married outside the Church (since the Church will not marry you again without an annulment), that too will be irregular. So how do we fix this?

If you are divorced, and you are looking to remarry or not planning on remarrying but want spiritual freedom, I would be more than happy to meet with you to discuss the annulment process. By petitioning for an annulment, the Diocesan Tribunal and I will look for something (grounds) that made your marriage invalid before your vows. For example, if your soon-to-be spouse was a gambler and you believed that once you got married, he/she would stop gambling, this would be a grave lack of discretion, as marriage will not change habits. Marriage is not a silver bullet. Some other grounds are: at least one partner didn't fully and freely consent; someone wasn't mature enough to understand the full extent of what they were doing; there was never intent to be faithful; one or both partners did not intend to be open to children, etc. There is a plethora of other grounds that go beyond the scope of this article.


Another critical item to discuss is that an annulment does not make your children illegitimate. Children of a marriage that's determined to be invalid by a Catholic annulment are still legitimate. (Code of Canon Law, When a couple marries, they assume the marriage is valid and was entered into in good faith. Children conceived under this assumption of a valid marriage are considered legitimate. This fact does not change even if the marriage is later found to be invalid. In the United States, Catholic annulment does not affect state civil laws. It is unrelated to civil concerns such as illegitimacy, child custody, alimony, visitation rights, or property division.

Now I know I have thrown a lot of information at you (and there is more, believe me). Just know one thing: it is not too late. If you are currently in an irregular marriage, this can be fixed and set on the right path. Some annulments are fast, and others take longer due to delicate situations. Whatever the case, if you have a question about your marriage, divorce, or remarriage, please do not hesitate to contact me. Even if you are blessed to be in a happy marriage, please keep this article so that you can give it to someone who one day may be struggling. Also, please continue to pray. This is the key to peace.

Neighbors helping neighbors. donations continue the SVDP mission in our community. Each year the need of our less fortunate neighbors increases and your generous giving enables us to assist where needed. Thank you.

Next weekend, January 13 and 14, the blue bins will be in the narthex of the church for food donations for the Holy Family and St. James the Less pantries. Items that are always needed are individual fruit cups, cans (flip-top or not) of soup, chili, vegetables and fruit, cereal, packs of snack crackers, pasta items and toilet paper. Bags of cookies, pretzels and oyster crackers that are divided into smaller bags for the bagged lunches given out at Holy Family. Also, during the winter the homeless at Holy Family need candles for heat and light. Even if the candles have been partially used, they are appreciated.

As a reminder there is a Box for Socks in the narthex for new men's and women's socks for the homeless. These socks are needed to keep their feet warm and dry but also for their hands and to carry small items. Also, needed are hand warmers.

In recommending these items, our intention is to make you aware of the items needed. We know it is impossible to supply all of their necessities, however, if we can assist in some small way, it is certainly appreciated.

Help Children Pray and Follow Sunday Mass

Prepare. Read the Gospel readings together the night before you attend Mass and engage your child in

discussion. Ask them simple, age-appropriate questions to get them thinking about what God is trying to tell us through His Word. Remind them to be listening for the reading during Mass.

Choose a Mass time that works well for your child's schedule. You don't want your child to be hungry or tired during Mass.

Help your children to feel engaged in the process of Mass. Show them how to genuflect before being seated. Have them walk with you during communion. Encourage them to offer a sign of peace at the appropriate time. Allow your child to put coins in the collection bowls. When you leave Mass, take a minute to have your child say hello to the priest if possible.

Identify aspects of the Mass that interest your child and make the most of them during Mass.

Help an emerging reader follow along with the readings, music, and prayers.



Prepare a "Mass bag." Fill a bag with special books such as a child's Bible or prayer book, a child-friendly rosary, saint cards, and/or a crucifix. Your child might especially enjoy a **MagnifiKid** booklet (bulletins for children in Preschool through 2nd Grade) that can be found in the narthex. Enjoy this free publication at church and at home.

Model. Model. Young children learn best by doing. Modeling the behavior you expect from your child is often a big encouragement. Remember, praising God is truly a joyful experience! Help your children enjoy Mass by allowing them to see you enjoying Mass.

Sit close to the Altar. This may seem counter-intuitive, but when children can see what is happening on the altar, they are more fully engaged.

Whisper. During prayers and responses, lean toward your child and whisper the response in their ear. Whispering forces the listener to concentrate a little more, helping your child to be fully present. This creates a special, intimate moment between you and helps them feel and understand the reverence in those moments.

Practice prayer at home. Being able to practice quieting themselves and being still for a few moments during prayer is a great way to teach self-regulation to children. It also has the added benefit of teaching the importance of daily prayer.

Talk about aspects of the Mass throughout the week. Find at least one thing to talk about with your child throughout the week. Review parts of the readings, the homily, or things like why we kneel, why we cross ourselves, or what the priest is doing when he sits down quietly after the homily. If children understand what we are doing and why, they begin to take ownership of their actions.

Bonus Tip: Remember that Saint Paul is your parish community!




JOIN Needs Your Help!

The Epiphany of the Lord, January 7


First Reading: Isaiah 60:1-6 Second Reading: Ephesians 3:2-3, 5-6 Gospel: Matthew 2:1-12

Epiphany means "manifestation," a revelation of Jesus as truly God. Matthew and Luke show this child to be divine through stories of "signs and wonders" when Jesus was an infant. Matthew's account of the visit of the

three magi also shows the Church's mission to the Gentiles. Matthew's audience, largely Jewish Christians, was struggling to accept the presence of Gentile Christians in their community. Matthew shows in this Gospel passage that the salvation of Gentiles as well as Jews was indeed God's plan.

What helps you stay focused on God's presence in everyday situations where God is usually not mentioned?



WORD OF THE WEEK

Preparation of the Gifts \pre-pa-'rā-shan | 'gifts\

The set of ceremonial actions at Mass preceding the Eucharistic Prayer and Holy Communion. Includes dressing of the altar; bringing forward the bread and wine; and the community's personal sacrifices taken up in the collection. Formerly called the Offertory. The community offers a song of praise for all these gifts as the priest washes his hands in a purification rite.

CONTEXT

The **Preparation of the Gifts** allows time for the preparation of our hearts. Like the Magi bearing gifts and doing homage to Majesty, we bring our gifts and our praise to the Table.

God has first blessed us with the gift of creation. Humans take those gifts given, wheat and grapes, and, using our creativity, make bread and wine. Then, we bring those gifts we have received and labored over to present them at the Altar/Table that they might be transformed into the Body and Blood of Christ. Finally, we receive them back in Communion. The procession of the **Gifts** says, in essence, "Behold the gifts God has given us!" —Father Roc O'Connor, S.J.

WHY IT MATTERS

We take great care preparing other festive tables for our most cherished gatherings. Could we do less for the table where the Real Presence of Christ will be made tangible for us?

From the General Instructions of the Roman Missal: The altar or Lord's table, which is the center of the whole Liturgy of the Eucharist, is made ready. . . . The offerings are then brought forward. It is a praiseworthy practice for the bread and wine to be presented by the faithful (73).

QUESTION OF THE WEEK

Is Epiphany about giving or getting gifts?

"We three kings of Orient are/ bearing gifts we traverse afar." Nowhere in the gospels does it claim there are three kings. They are magi, hereditary priests of the ancient Medes and Persians. At least the carol gets one thing right: this wise group does bear gifts. Gold symbolizes wealth and power. Frankincense, used in prayer, represents the divine Presence. Myrrh prepares bodies for burial. It's an ominous sign that would make a startling gift... But they were appropriate honors for the King of the Universe, the Divine Son, and the crucified Lord.

We also bear Jesus gifts at every Eucharist: bread, wine, and our financial sacrifice. "Made by human hands," these gifts are transformed and returned to us as the Body and Blood of Christ, and then redistributed for those in need.

More gifts come to us by way of this shared Table. Grace pours out on the assembly. Grace forgives sin, and rescues us from every evil. This is one gift you don't want to put at the bottom of a closet.




