THE CATECHETICAL CORNER



Why is it Covered?

When I was growing up, I began to serve Mass when I was in the fourth grade. It was always a great honor to help prepare the sanctuary for Mass. During my childhood, my parish had an old Monsignor for our pastor. He was the type who would wear his biretta and other adorned vestments. Shortly after his retirement, our parish got a new pastor who was quite the opposite. It was a shock for many parishioners. As the saying goes, "the devil you know is better than the devil you don't."

Nevertheless, one thing I particularly remember preparing when I was a young server was the chalice. Now, you may be thinking, "What is there to prepare? You just set the chalice out." Yes and no.

Similar to my childhood, here at St. Paul, we use liturgical items called a chalice veil and burse. The chalice veil is a cloth that adorns the sacred vessels of the Eucharist and serves not only a practical purpose but also carries deep spiritual significance. It is not merely a piece of fabric but a symbol of the mysteries that lie at the heart of our faith.

First and foremost, the chalice veil reminds us of the veil that once separated humanity from the presence of God. In ancient times, the Holy of Holies in the temple was shrouded in a veil, symbolizing the separation between God and His people due to sin. However, through the sacrifice of Christ, this veil was torn asunder, granting us direct access to God's presence. Likewise, the chalice veil, when lifted, reveals the consecrated elements—the chalice that will hold his Precious Blood—the very presence of Christ among us—signifying the tearing of the veil that once separated us from God's grace.

Furthermore, veiling and unveiling the chalice during Mass parallels the unfolding of divine mysteries. Just as the disciples' eyes were opened to recognize the risen Christ in the breaking of bread, so too are our eyes opened as the veil is lifted, revealing the true presence of our Lord. The chalice veil thus becomes a tangible reminder of the transformative power of the Eucharist, which opens our hearts and minds to the mysteries of God's love and redemption.

The chalice veil speaks to the reverence with which we should approach the sacrament. Its covering of the sacred vessels symbolizes our recognition of the profound mystery therein—a mystery too great for human comprehension. It reminds us of the need for humility and awe in the presence of the divine, prompting us to approach the altar with hearts filled with reverence and adoration.

Another simple yet profound object that holds great significance within the celebration of the Mass is the burse. The word burse comes from the Latin meaning "bag or container." Though seemingly mundane, the burse serves as a vessel for something sacred, reminding us of the beauty and reverence we should bring to our worship.

In its essence, the burse is a small pouch or container used to hold the corporal, a square white linen cloth upon which the consecrated elements of the Eucharist are placed during Mass. While it may appear insignificant compared to the grandeur of the chalice or the splendor of the altar, the burse plays a crucial role in safeguarding the precious Body and Blood of Christ.

Consider for a moment the symbolism embedded within the burse. It represents the humility of Christ, who chose to dwell among us in the most ordinary of forms. Just as the burse quietly held the corporal, so did Jesus embrace humanity in all its fragility and simplicity.

Moreover, the burse serves as a tangible reminder of the dignity and reverence we owe to the Eucharist. Within its folds lie the elements that unite us as one body in Christ, inviting us to approach the altar with hearts open to receive His grace and mercy.

In a world often consumed by materialism and superficiality, the burse calls us to embrace the sacred amid the mundane. It teaches us that even the simplest of vessels can become vessels of grace when offered in service to God.

Let us recognize the profound symbolism encapsulated in the chalice veil and burse. As we behold these seemingly ordinary pieces of fabric, may we be reminded of the extraordinary truths they represent—the tearing of the veil, the unveiling of divine mysteries, and the call to approach the Eucharist with reverence and awe. May they inspire us to deepen our appreciation for the sacrament and live in constant communion with our Lord.

Divine Mercy Sunday

Mankind's need for the message of Divine Mercy took on dire urgency in the 20th Century, when civilization began to experience an "eclipse of the sense of God" and, therefore to lose the understanding of the sanctity and inherent dignity of human life. In the 1930s, Jesus chose a humble Polish nun, St. Maria Faustina Kowalska, to receive private revelations concerning Divine Mercy that were recorded in her Diary. St. Faustina's Diary records 14 occasions when Jesus requested that a Feast of Mercy (Divine Mercy Sunday) be observed. On May 5, 2000, five days after the canonization of St. Faustina, the Vatican decreed that the Second Sunday of Easter would henceforth be known as Divine Mercy Sunday.

Jesus appeared to St. Faustina in a vision, with his right hand raised in a blessing and his left touching his garment above his heart. Red and white rays emanate from his heart, symbolizing the blood and water that was poured out for our salvation and our sanctification. The Lord requested that "Jesus, I trust in You" be inscribed under his image. Jesus asked that his image be painted and venerated throughout the world: "I promise that the soul that will venerate this image will not perish" (Diary, no. 48) and "By means of this image I will grant many graces to souls" (Diary, no. 742).

The Chaplet was given to St. Faustina with this promise: "Encourage souls to say the chaplet which I have given you" (Diary, no. 1541). "Whoever will recite it will receive great mercy at the hour of death ...I desire that the whole world know My infinite mercy" (Diary, no. 687). Jesus also gave St. Faustina nine intentions, the Divine Mercy Novena, for which to pray the Chaplet beginning on Good Friday and ending on the Saturday before Divine Mercy Sunday. How to Go to Confession...

May the Passion of Our Lord Jesus Christ, the intercession of the Blessed Virgin Mary and of all the saints,

whatever good you do and suffering you endure, heal your sins, help you grow in holiness, and reward you with eternal life.
Go in peace.

-Rite of Penance, no. 93

- 1 PREPARATION: Before going to confession, take some time to prepare. Begin with prayer, and reflect on your life since your last confession. How have you—in your thoughts, words, and actions—neglected to live Christ's commands to "love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind," and to "love your neighbor as yourself" (Mt 22:37, 39)? As a help with this "examination of conscience," you might review the Ten Commandments or the Beatitudes (Ex 20:2-17; Dt 5:6-21; Mt 5:3-10; or Lk 6:20-26).
- 2 GREETING: The priest will welcome you; he may say a short blessing or read a Scripture passage.
- 3 THE SIGN OF THE CROSS: Together, you and the priest will make the Sign of the Cross. You may then begin your confession with these or similar words: "Bless me, Father, for I have sinned. It has been [give days, months, or years] since my last confession."
- 4 CONFESSION: Confess all your sins to the priest. If you are unsure what to say, ask the priest for help. When you are finished, conclude with these or similar words: "I am sorry for these and all my sins."
- 5 PENANCE: The priest will propose an act of penance. The penance might be prayer, a work of mercy, or an act of charity. He might also counsel you on how to better live a Christian life.

6 ACT OF CONTRITION: After the priest has conferred your penance, pray an Act of Contrition, expressing sorrow for your sins and resolving to sin no more. A suggested Act of Contrition is:

My God,
I am sorry for my sins with all my heart.
In choosing to do wrong
and failing to do good,
I have sinned against you
whom I should love above all things.
I firmly intend, with your help,
to do penance,
to sin no more,
and to avoid whatever leads me to sin.
Our Savior Jesus Christ
suffered and died for us.
In his name, my God, have mercy.

(Rite of Penance, no. 45)

- 7 ABSOLUTION: The priest will extend his hands over your head and pronounce the words of absolution. You respond, "Amen."
- B PRAISE: The priest will usually praise the mercy of God and will invite you to do the same. For example, the priest may say, "Give thanks to the Lord for he is good." And your response would be, "His mercy endures for ever" (*Rite of Penance*, no. 47).
- 9 DISMISSAL: The priest will conclude the sacrament, often saying, "Go in peace."

If it has been a while since your last confession, remember, "Do not fear" (Is 41:10). The priest will help guide you. And feel free to take this how-to guide with you! (For more information, visit www.usccb.org/confession.)



CONNECTING THE WORD OF GOD TO OUR LIVES

Reflecting on the Gospel for the Fourth Sunday of Lent, March 10, 2024

First Reading: 2 Chronicles 36:14-16, 19-23; Second Reading: Ephesians 2:4-10; Gospel: John 3:14-21

Jesus said to Nicodemus: "Just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the desert, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, so that everyone who believes in him may have eternal life." John 3:14-15

The line quoted above concludes a dialogue that Jesus had with Nicodemus, a Pharisee and a member of the Sanhedrin. This is the first of three times Nicodemus is mentioned in the Gospel of John. The second time he appears is when he reminds the other members of the Sanhedrin that a man must be first heard before he is condemned. The third time was when Jesus was killed and Nicodemus brought a mixture of myrrh and aloes to prepare Jesus' body for burial.

Jesus was not accepted by most of the Pharisees and within the Sanhedrin. For that reason, Nicodemus was taking a risk by going to him at night to talk. But Jesus clearly senses faith in the heart of Nicodemus, which is why when Nicodemus asks Jesus about His teaching, Jesus answers him. Unlike the other Pharisees, Nicodemus was not trying to trap our Lord; he sincerely wanted to understand.

At the beginning of this dialogue between Jesus and Nicodemus, Nicodemus professes the beginning of faith in Jesus when he says, "Rabbi, we know that you are a teacher who has come from God, for no one can do these signs that you are doing unless God is with him" (John 3:2). Interestingly, Jesus then speaks to Nicodemus in figures of speech, saying that one can only enter the Kingdom of God when they are "born from above" and "born from water and the Spirit." Nicodemus tries to understand but fails. Jesus then gently rebukes him by saying, "You are the teacher of Israel and you do not understand this?" (John 3:10). Jesus then goes on to speak further in symbolic language and figures of speech, concluding with the beginning of today's Gospel quoted above when He speaks in a veiled way about His coming crucifixion.

One thing that is important to understand from this dialogue between Jesus and Nicodemus is that Jesus' language is veiled in symbolic language because, even though Nicodemus was on the right path, he was not yet ready for the full revelation of the Gospel. He could not yet fully comprehend all that our Lord came to reveal. Thus, Jesus spoke in veiled language and invited Nicodemus to keep seeking its hidden meaning.

In our own lives, we can come to God and want Him to speak clearly and definitively to us, revealing His perfect will for our lives. But often He doesn't. Why? Because God knows we are not yet ready for the full truth. When He speaks to us and when we gain insight in one way or another, this is good and reveals we are on the right path. But the Gospel, in its fullness, is so radical and so demanding that most people are not yet ready for the full truth. Therefore, in His compassion, God gives us only what we can handle at the moment. But this humble truth should encourage us, as it did Nicodemus, to not give up and to continue opening ourselves to the fullness of the Word of God.

Reflect, today, upon how open you are to the fullness of God's Word. What would happen if God were to reveal to you, by an immediate personal revelation of divine knowledge, all that was in His sacred mind? Would it be too much for you to handle? Yes, it would be. But that humble admission is an important step toward that very goal. Humble yourself, today, more fully before the mysterious Word of God and pray that you will continue to be changed and open so that the clarity of God's truth will more fully penetrate your soul.






