



THE CATECHETICAL CORNER



Peek-a-boo!

As you gather in this sacred space, you constantly find yourself surrounded by the symbols and reminders of our faith. Yet, during this Fifth Sunday of Lent to the Easter Vigil (Passiontide), you may have noticed a significant change—the statues that usually adorn our church have been covered. No, we are not tired of looking at them. No, they have not been repossessed. While it may appear counterintuitive to veil statues and images during the final weeks of Lent, the Catholic Church recommends this practice to heighten our senses and build a longing for Easter Sunday. But why go to such lengths to cover up images designed to raise our hearts and minds toward heaven?

This tradition of covering statues during Lent is more than merely a superficial alteration of our surroundings. It carries profound spiritual significance, inviting us to delve deeper into the mystery of Christ's sacrifice and our journey of conversion. When we walk into church and notice everything is covered, we immediately know something is different. These last two weeks of Lent are meant to be a time of immediate preparation for the Sacred Triduum, and these veils are a forceful reminder to get ready. The Church uses veils to produce a heightened anticipation for Easter Sunday. This is further actualized when you attend daily Mass and see the veils each day. You don't want them to be there because they are hiding something beautiful.

The veils seem out of place and even counterintuitive. It can seem strange that the crucifix is covered up during Passiontide. Our senses are heightened through this absence of images, and we become more aware of what is missing. Similarly, the suppression of the Alleluia during Lent effectively demonstrates that we are in exile from our true home, where the angels sing Alleluia without ceasing. When images are unveiled before the Easter Vigil, we are reminded that we, in a sense, live in a veiled world. Through our death, we can see our true home, and the veil is lifted. Christ lifts the veil through His Resurrection.

In covering these statues, we are reminded of the words of St. Paul, who wrote to the Corinthians, "We proclaim Christ crucified" (1 Corinthians 1:23). Lent is a time for us to enter into the mystery of Christ's passion, death, and resurrection. By veiling the statues, we symbolically enter into the tomb's darkness, acknowledging the absence of Christ's physical presence during his time in the wilderness and his ultimate sacrifice on the cross.

But this act of veiling is not meant to leave us in despair or sorrow. Instead, it is a call to deeper reflection and spiritual renewal. It invites us to strip away the world's distractions and focus on the profound mystery of God's love revealed in Christ's sacrifice. As we journey through the desert of Lent, we are called to imitate Christ's humility and self-emptying love. Just as he willingly embraced the cross for the salvation of humanity, so too are we called to take up our crosses and follow him. By covering the statues, we are reminded of the call to embrace the austerity of Lent—fasting, prayer, and almsgiving—as we strive to grow closer to God and one another.

But even as we contemplate the tomb's darkness, we do so with the hope of Easter on the horizon. The veiling of the statues is but a temporary measure, a prelude to the joyous celebration of Christ's Resurrection. Just as the covering will be removed on Easter Sunday, so will the light of Christ pierce through the darkness of sin and death, bringing new life and hope to all who believe.

As we journey through this season of Lent, may we embrace the symbolism of the covered statues as a reminder of Christ's sacrifice and our call to conversion. May we strip away the world's distractions and enter a deeper relationship with our crucified and risen Lord. May we eagerly anticipate the joy of Easter, when the veil will be lifted, and we will behold the glory of our Resurrected Savior.



Divine Mercy Sunday

Mankind's need for the message of Divine Mercy took on dire urgency in the 20th Century, when civilization began to experience an "eclipse of the sense of God" and, therefore to lose the understanding of the sanctity and inherent dignity of human life. In the 1930s, Jesus chose a humble Polish nun, St. Maria Faustina Kowalska, to receive private revelations concerning Divine Mercy that were recorded in her Diary. St. Faustina's Diary records 14 occasions when Jesus requested that a Feast of Mercy (Divine Mercy Sunday) be observed. On May 5, 2000, five days after the canonization of St. Faustina, the Vatican decreed that the Second Sunday of Easter would henceforth be known as Divine Mercy Sunday.

Jesus appeared to St. Faustina in a vision, with his right hand raised in a blessing and his left touching his garment above his heart. Red and white rays emanate from his heart, symbolizing the blood and water that was poured out for our salvation and our sanctification. The Lord requested that "Jesus, I trust in You" be inscribed under his image. Jesus asked that his image be painted and venerated throughout the world: "I promise that the soul that will venerate this image will not perish" (Diary, no. 48) and "By means of this image I will grant many graces to souls" (Diary, no. 742).

The Chaplet was given to St. Faustina with this promise: "Encourage souls to say the chaplet which I have given you" (Diary, no. 1541). "Whoever will recite it will receive great mercy at the hour of death ...I desire that the whole world know My infinite mercy" (Diary, no. 687). Jesus also gave St. Faustina nine intentions, the Divine Mercy Novena, for which to pray the Chaplet beginning on Good Friday and ending on the Saturday before Divine Mercy Sunday. How to Go to Confession...

May the Passion of Our Lord Jesus Christ, the intercession of the Blessed Virgin Mary and of all the saints,

whatever good you do and suffering you endure, heal your sins, help you grow in holiness, and reward you with eternal life.
Go in peace.

-Rite of Penance, no. 93

- 1 PREPARATION: Before going to confession, take some time to prepare. Begin with prayer, and reflect on your life since your last confession. How have you—in your thoughts, words, and actions—neglected to live Christ's commands to "love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind," and to "love your neighbor as yourself" (Mt 22:37, 39)? As a help with this "examination of conscience," you might review the Ten Commandments or the Beatitudes (Ex 20:2-17; Dt 5:6-21; Mt 5:3-10; or Lk 6:20-26).
- GREETING: The priest will welcome you; he may say a short blessing or read a Scripture passage.
- THE SIGN OF THE CROSS: Together, you and the priest will make the Sign of the Cross. You may then begin your confession with these or similar words: "Bless me, Father, for I have sinned. It has been [give days, months, or years] since my last confession."
- 4 CONFESSION: Confess all your sins to the priest. If you are unsure what to say, ask the priest for help. When you are finished, conclude with these or similar words: "I am sorry for these and all my sins."
- 5 PENANCE: The priest will propose an act of penance. The penance might be prayer, a work of mercy, or an act of charity. He might also counsel you on how to better live a Christian life.

6 ACT OF CONTRITION: After the priest has conferred your penance, pray an Act of Contrition, expressing sorrow for your sins and resolving to sin no more. A suggested Act of Contrition is:

My God,
I am sorry for my sins with all my heart.
In choosing to do wrong
and failing to do good,
I have sinned against you
whom I should love above all things.
I firmly intend, with your help,
to do penance,
to sin no more,
and to avoid whatever leads me to sin.
Our Savior Jesus Christ
suffered and died for us.
In his name, my God, have mercy.

(Rite of Penance, no. 45)

- 7 ABSOLUTION: The priest will extend his hands over your head and pronounce the words of absolution. You respond, "Amen."
- B PRAISE: The priest will usually praise the mercy of God and will invite you to do the same. For example, the priest may say, "Give thanks to the Lord for he is good." And your response would be, "His mercy endures for ever" (*Rite of Penance*, no. 47).
- 9 DISMISSAL: The priest will conclude the sacrament, often saying, "Go in peace."

If it has been a while since your last confession, remember, "Do not fear" (Is 41:10). The priest will help guide you. And feel free to take this how-to guide with you! (For more information, visit www.usccb.org/confession.)





Reflecting on the Gospel for the Fifth Sunday of Lent, March 17, 2024

Jeremiah 31:31-34; Hebrews 5:7-9; John 12:20-33

Our Lord's human soul was "troubled." Other translations state that His soul was in agony. After expressing His interior suffering, Jesus identified the human temptation caused by this suffering: to flee from His "hour." Of course Jesus dismisses this temptation as a way of teaching us a lesson from His human experience.

As God, Jesus had perfect strength and always remained faithful to the mission He received from the Father. But as a human, Jesus permitted Himself to experience temptation and human suffering for many reasons. One reason was so that He could relate to us in every way. That includes being able to relate to interior human suffering. In doing so, Jesus also made it possible for us to imitate Him and to share in the strength and determination He had as He perfectly fulfilled the will of the Father. Jesus allowed Himself to endure the agony caused by foreseen suffering because we will endure similar temptations through life.

What is it that causes you fear and anxiety as you look into the future? If there is something that immediately comes to mind, try to look at that within the light of Jesus' own experience above. The first thing Jesus does is identify the temptation to fear. He does this by identifying the interior suffering He experiences and then by looking at the cause: His coming "hour." The "hour" of Jesus in the Gospel of John is a reference to His crucifixion and death. This was the reason He came to us. He came to suffer the consequences of our sins and to destroy death itself. But this mission of His was the cause of true human suffering and was also a temptation toward fear. But it was a fear that He perfectly overcame.

As you look at anything that tempts you to give into fear and anxiety, first ask yourself whether it is the will of God that you fulfill that action. If we are fearful of something that is not the will of the Father, then we should reject it. But very often the plan God has for our lives will include acting with courage in the face of some pending cross and suffering.

Experiencing fear is normal, but fear will not turn into anxiety if we imitate our Lord and choose the will of God no matter the cost.

Jesus also embraced His Cross by looking at it through the lens of glory. He understood that His suffering and death would glorify the Father in Heaven. Therefore, He allowed Himself to see the Cross as a glorification of the Father. The same must happen in our lives. No matter what we face in life, no matter the cross we are given, if it is the will of God that we embrace it, then we must see it not only as a suffering we must endure but primarily as an act by which God will be glorified in our lives. This truer perspective will bring with it hope, joy and strength which will free us from anxiety caused by fear.

Reflect, today, upon the ways in which God is calling you to the cross. As you do, don't allow fear to deter you. Instead, look at every pending suffering as an opportunity to glorify God in your life. See your crosses with gratitude and joy, and allow this new perspective to give you the strength you need to fulfill the mission given to you by the Father in Heaven.

Most glorious Father, Your will is perfect. You called Your Son to the suffering of the Cross. Through that act of perfect love, the suffering Your Son endured gave You perfect glory. Lord Jesus, please give me Your courage as I face my own sufferings in life and help me to imitate Your perfect obedience to the Father's will in all things so that I, too, may give Him glory. Jesus, I trust in You.






